Financial Aid

Kaplan University offers detailed information to guide you through the financial aid process. You deserve the simplest and best possible plan to finance your education. As an accredited learning institution, Kaplan University helps qualified students apply for and receive Title IV federal financial aid, including grants and loans, for any of our degree programs.* In addition, we can help determine if you are eligible for state grants or scholarships.

Federal student loan programs are available to students who qualify. We currently offer Subsidized Stafford, Unsubsidized Stafford, and Parent Plus loans through the Direct Loan program with the US Department of Education.

*Eligibility is based on U.S. Department of Education criteria and is determined from data submitted on the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). Students may also be required to submit supporting documentation as part of a verification process to determine eligibility for financial aid.

Students who receive loans to pay for their course of instruction must realize that it is their responsibility to repay the full amount of the loan, plus interest, less the amount of any refund. Defaulting on loans guaranteed or reinsured by the state or federal government could result in damage to credit ratings, loss of eligibility for future student loans and other forms of financial aid, loss of deferment and monthly payment options, withholding of state and federal income tax refunds, initiation of court action, and garnishment of wages.

Additional information on eligibility requirements, alternate financing, amounts available, interest rates, scholarships, and repayment schedules is available from the Financial Aid Office.

*Kaplan University may be eligible to be an approved training provider for Workforce Investment Act (WIA) student aid. Students must contact their local WIA One-Stop Centers or their Local Workforce Investment Boards to determine training program eligibility.

Applying for Financial Aid

Kaplan University has provided a guide to help you through the financial aid process. Our checklist contains instructions so you can track your progress through each of the five steps.

STEP 1: Your FSA ID

Getting your U.S. Department of Education Federal Student Account Identification (FSA ID) is the first must-do step in applying for financial aid. Your FSA ID is your electronic signature. It allows you to electronically sign your Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), check its status online, and access your account information. Your FSA ID is an important part of your financial aid process and you will continue to use it throughout your educational career. Keep your FSA ID handy and secure.

If you decide to apply for financial aid, visit the U.S. Department of Education FSA ID Registration website (<https://fsaid.ed.gov>) and click “Create an FSA ID.”

STEP 2: Your FAFSA

1. Once you have your FSA ID, complete the FAFSA located at www.fafsa.ed.gov. Use your FSA ID to electronically sign your FAFSA.
2. Step 5 will ask you for a school code. Your school code is _____
3. Step 6 allows you to print a copy of your FAFSA for your records.
Very Important: If you do not print/copy the submission page at this time, you will be unable to access it for 24 to 72 hours.
4. Step 10 of 10 submits your FAFSA application to the U.S. Department of Education. Click on “Submit My FAFSA Now” to complete the process.
5. You should receive your Student Aid Report, which is an acknowledgment of your submitted information, in about 2 weeks.

STEP 3: Your Projected Funding Plan

After you have obtained your FSA ID and submitted your FAFSA, your projected funding plan will be provided to you by Kaplan University’s Financial Aid Office. It is an estimation of what you will receive in federal, state, and Kaplan University aid, or scholarships.

You should review and approve the plan with one of the Student Finance Advisors at Kaplan University. Please note that this funding plan estimation is subject to change based on student information contained in the Institutional Student Information Record (ISIR), which is sent to Kaplan University by the federal government.

STEP 4: Master Promissory Note

Now you are ready to obtain and sign the Master Promissory Note (MPN). All students seeking federal student loans must complete a MPN with Direct Loans. You must do this before you can receive your loan. The MPN should be completed electronically with Direct Loans via the StudentLoans.gov (<https://studentloans.gov/myDirectLoan/index.action>) website.

STEP 5: Entrance Counseling

The U.S. Department of Education requires that all students wishing to borrow under the federal Stafford loan program participate in a loan entrance counseling before receiving funds. To help you satisfy this requirement, visit the Direct Loans website (<https://studentloans.gov/myDirectLoan/index.action>). Please note, to complete this entrance counseling and exam you will need your FSA ID to access your loan documentation.

Next Steps

Once you submit your financial aid information, the Financial Aid Office will review your information and will be in touch to let you know if there are any additional forms that you will need to fill out to complete the financial aid process.

Financial Aid Verification

The verification process is used to verify information included on a student's FAFSA to ensure it is accurate. There are several reasons why a student's FAFSA may be selected for verification, including contradictory or incomplete data. Applications are also selected at random.

If your FAFSA is selected for verification, the federal government will require the Kaplan University Financial Aid Office to collect additional documents from you. If this occurs, the Financial Aid Office will notify you of which forms to send and their associated due dates.

Students who apply for financial aid are responsible for completing all the necessary steps and submitting any required documentation in a timely manner.

Financial Aid for Non-U.S. Citizens

Aid From Your Home Country

Contact the cultural section of your country's embassy or ministry of education to inquire about financial aid options and their requirements.

Aid From the U.S. Government

The majority of U.S. government financial assistance is not offered to international students. The U.S. government does provide aid to students from specific countries—you can request more information from your embassy or the U.S. State Department.

Bank Loans

Kaplan University works with a variety of lenders to offer alternative credit-based loans to international students. Applicants are encouraged to apply with a cosigner. Cosigners must be a U.S. citizen or permanent resident and meets the lender's criteria.

Scholarships

Kaplan University is committed to helping you achieve your educational goals. Each of the below scholarship programs, if awarded, can help you pay for your education here at Kaplan University. You can even apply for outside scholarships to help fund the pursuit of your dream.

Kaplan University Scholarships

General Guidelines

Students selected for scholarship awards will be notified of their award upon receipt and verification of all official application materials. Unless otherwise noted, scholarships may be combined with financial aid and outside scholarships not funded by Kaplan University, but cannot be used in conjunction with any other Kaplan University discount, tuition reduction, voucher, grant, or scholarship. Kaplan University reserves the right to amend scholarship policies or awards, or discontinue granting scholarships to additional students at any time. Scholarships granted shall be honored in their entirety according to the guidelines specified. Except as expressly provided, scholarships are limited to a maximum of one per student.

Benefits for Military Personnel, Their Spouses, and Veterans

At Kaplan University we believe in the potential of our military in the classroom and in their careers; we are committed to helping them achieve that potential. Active-duty servicemembers and veterans are eligible for special tuition rates for undergraduate and graduate programs. Reduced tuition for spouses of active-duty servicemembers is also available.

Military Educational Benefits Information

Military Tuition Assistance

If approved by the Education Services Officer, military tuition assistance may pay up to \$166.67 per quarter credit hour for a maximum of \$4,500 per year for Air Force and Marines. The annual cap for Army and Navy is \$4,000. The annual cap for Coast Guard is \$3,375. If you exhaust these funds, which may cover up to 5 classes each year in a Kaplan University undergraduate program, you may be able to use Top-Up benefits from the GI Bill® to cover the balance.*

Montgomery GI Bill

Montgomery GI Bill benefits provide up to \$1,789 per month depending on how many courses are taken. In most cases, Kaplan University undergraduate tuition would be covered by this rate.*

The Post-9/11 GI Bill

At the 100 percent entitlement level, the Post-9/11 GI Bill tuition and fee benefits are capped at \$21,970.46 each year for use at Kaplan University. In most cases this covers all tuition and fees in Kaplan University programs. However, please note that if you are not entitled to 100 percent benefit rate, you will be responsible for that portion of the tuition. For example, if you are entitled to 80 percent of the Post-9/11 GI Bill benefit, you would be responsible to pay for 20 percent of your tuition and fees using other funding sources.

The Yellow Ribbon Program

Kaplan University participates in the Yellow Ribbon Program for all its undergraduate and graduate programs. The program assists when tuition expenses exceed the Post-9/11 GI Bill cap of \$21,970.46. If you are eligible for the Yellow Ribbon Program, which is offered if you have the 100 percent entitlement to the Post 9/11-GI Bill benefits, Kaplan University has agreed to waive a percentage of those expenses and the VA will match the same amount as the University. This will result in 100 percent coverage of tuition and fee costs for eligible veterans. Note: Service members on Active Duty and a Spouse of an Active Duty Service Member are not eligible for the Yellow Ribbon program.

MyCAA Spousal Assistance Program

The My Career Advancement Account (MyCAA) program provides up to \$4,000 in educational funding for an associate's degree, certificate, or licensure program for eligible military spouses. To be eligible you must be the spouse of E-1 to E-5, W-1 and W-2, or O1 and O-2. The maximum amount is \$2,000 per year and there are completion requirements.

Financial Aid Advisors/Student Finance Advisors

Kaplan University has Financial Aid Advisors (Student Finance Advisors for campuses and learning centers) available to assist you with answering questions regarding your military benefits. We recommend you speak with an Advisor as well as the Veterans Administration and/or a Education Services Officer to determine your funding options.

Federal Student Aid

Federal student aid for military students not eligible for military tuition assistance or GI Bill benefits may be available to those who qualify. Kaplan University can help determine if you are eligible for federal financial aid, including grants and loan programs.

*Some programs have additional associated fees that are not included in the price of tuition. Check with an Admissions Advisor.

Reduced tuition benefits may not be combined with scholarships, military discounts, tuition vouchers, grants, and other discounts.

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Financial Aid Fact Sheet

I. Federal Pell Grant: Gift Assistance that is not repaid.

II. Federal Stafford Loan (Subsidized): Must be repaid.

- A. Current award amounts range from \$0 to \$3,500 for first-year undergraduate students, based on eligibility.
- B. For loans first disbursed between July 1, 2016 and June 30, 2017, the interest rate is at 3.76%.
- C. Interest accrues immediately after the student leaves school or drops below half time.
- D. Payments are not made until six months after the student leaves school or drops below half time.
- E. Contact the loan servicer to inquire about repayment or forbearance options.

III. Federal Stafford Loan (Unsubsidized): Must be repaid.

- A. Current award amounts range from \$0-\$6,000 for first-year undergraduate students based on eligibility.
- B. Current award amounts range from \$0 to \$20,500 for graduate students based on eligibility.
- C. For loans first disbursed between July 1, 2016 and June 30, 2017, the interest rate for the undergraduate rate is fixed at 3.76% and the graduate rate is fixed at 5.31%.
- D. Interest begins to accrue immediately upon disbursement.
- E. Payment of principal begins six months after the student leaves school or drops below half time.
- F. Contact the loan servicer to inquire about repayment or forbearance options.

IV. Federal PLUS Loan (PLUS): Must be repaid.

- A. For loans first disbursed on or after July 1, 2016, the interest rate is fixed at 6.31%.
- B. Interest accrues immediately upon disbursement.
- C. Direct PLUS Loans enter repayment when they are fully disbursed (paid out). Your loan will be placed into deferment while you are in school at least half-time and for an additional 6 months after you graduate or drop below half-time.
- D. Contact the loan servicer to inquire about repayment or forbearance options.
