Security and ensuring the safety of the general public is a high priority for both government agencies and corporations. Help secure the safety of your community and protect public and corporate assets by building your knowledge with an Associate of Applied Science in Public Safety and Security from Kaplan University.

According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, America will need more than 132,000 private detectives, investigators, and security professionals between 2012 and 2022.² New opportunities within public safety and security are expected to result from heightened security concerns and

the increased need to safeguard the general public. In addition, continued demand for public safety is likely to contribute to the demand for police services.³

Demand for professionals with college experience is also on the rise. In 2013, more than 20% of police departments required new entry-level officers to have at least a 2-year college degree, compared to 7% in 2003.⁴ Earning your associate's degree in public safety and security builds a path toward earning your bachelor's degree in criminal justice, which could position you for further advancement.⁵

Prepare for a Wide Range of Careers Options

The public safety and security industry boasts numerous career choices in a variety of public and private sector fields. An Associate of Applied Science in Public Safety and Security may qualify you to pursue employment opportunities in areas such as computer crime, corrections, criminal investigation, loss prevention, fraud investigation, emergency management and response, law enforcement, public and private security, private investigations, or public safety.

An associate's degree from Kaplan University could help you pursue work in these environments:

- › Federal, state, and local government agencies and organizations
- › Police departments (additional academy training usually required)
- › Corporate security departments
- › Emergency response agencies

Possible Career Opportunities and Day-to-Day Activities:¹

- › Law enforcement (police officers and detectives; additional academy training usually required)—Pursue and apprehend individuals who break the law, and issue citations and warnings or make arrests; work to keep the peace and protect the public.
- › Emergency response—Assist in the organization and coordination of resources in response to emergency events in an effort to protect and keep communities safe.
- › Public safety—Develop plans and coordinated responses that are designed to prevent and protect the public from dangers such as crimes or disasters.
- › Corporate security—Develop security measures and protocols to protect employees and safeguard corporate assets.
- › Investigation—Assist in the gathering and compilation of information related to unlawful occurrences or rule infractions among private parties.

Build Your Strong Foundation With a Specialized Education

Kaplan University's public safety and security program is designed to offer a strong foundation of professional skills and public safety and security knowledge.
